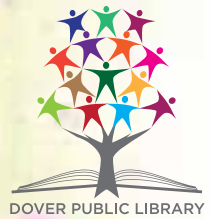

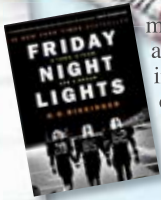

"Libraries change lives. They are the soul of a people."

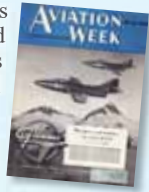

Library staff at DPL frequently hear stories about how the public library has influenced people's lives. I was one of those kids who always had his nose in a book. In fact, growing up on a farm outside of Beach City my parents would take my brother and sisters and I to the Dover Public Library whenever we would go "downtown" for shopping, doctors appointments or church. In fact, I think I read

most of the baseball and football books in the 796 section of the library. I still remember discovering H.G. Bissinger's classic account of Texas high school football in his 1990 book, *Friday Night Lights: A Town, A Team, and a Dream*. Yes, I was that "nerd" always reading a book in study hall!

One of my favorite stories I have heard from visitors to the library was in May of 2011. I was working the Front Desk when a gentleman asked me if we carried the magazine, *Aviation News & Space Technology*. I informed him that we had recently made the difficult decision to cut the magazine from our collection because of the cost. This is what he told me: "I'm actually visiting from out of town. I grew up in Dover and spent nearly every Saturday in this library. I discovered *Aviation News & Space Technology*

when I was nine years old and to this day I read it faithfully. In fact, it so influenced my life that I now am an aerospace engineer working for NASA." I was further blown away when he informed me he would donate funds to cover the cost of the magazine so another generation of dreamers can be inspired. Wow! This was an incredible reminder to the library staff and myself about the power of the public library and its potential to change lives. It reinforced to us that we should never take what we do on a daily basis for granted. Every person who walks in our doors, from a toddler to a senior citizen, has the potential to find something in our library that can inspire and change their lives. Welcome to our library! 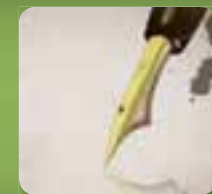

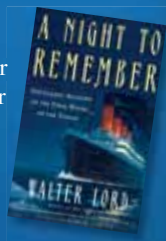

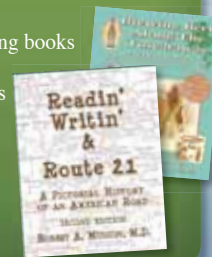

Tuscarawas Valley Civil War Round Table

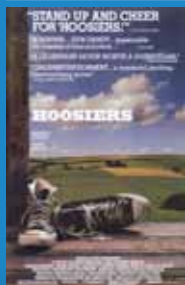

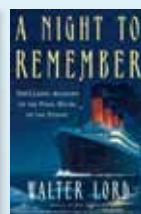

FAQ's

How do I get a library card and how much does it cost?

Library cards are issued at any public service desk in the library. Bring in a valid photo ID with your current address on it. There is no cost to get a library card!

How long can I keep library materials?

In general, books go out for 14 days. Most NEW books go out for 7 days. DVDs and video games go out for 3 days.

How do I renew items on my card?

You can call the library at 330-343-6123, stop by any time that we are open, or you can access your account online from our website: www.doverlibrary.org

How much are the overdue fines at the library?

Overdue fines for teen and adult books is \$.10/day. Fines for DVDs are \$.50/day. Fines for children's books are \$.05/day.

Where may I return materials when the library is closed?

The library has two after-hours book drops. One is located to the left of the front door of the library on N. Walnut St. The second is located in back of the library just off the parking lot.

How can I get items the library does not own?

Through Interlibrary Loan! Although DPL is a stand-alone library, we do borrow books, audiobooks, movies, and music CDs from other libraries. See any public service desk for more information.

Can I ask a reference question? Is it possible to do it by phone or email?

Any public service desk can assist you if you have a question about anything at all. Staff may redirect you to another department if they feel it is necessary. You can also call the library at 330-343-6123 or you can email the library at gillja@oplin.org
