FORAKER TALKS.

In a Long Speech He Denounces the Hepburn Railroad Rate Bill.

Washington, March 1.—For three hours on Wednesday Mr. Foraker held the attention of the senate while he read a carefully prepared speech on the railroad rate question. His speech was a protest against any general legislation on the theory that the existing law could be so extended as to make it answer all the requirements. He did not fail, however, to point out what he considered the defects of the Hepburn-Doolittle bill, and he made the declaration more than once that it would fall to remedy the evils complained of. Mr. Foraker's speech was followed by a further discussion of the railroad land grant in Indian Territory, with the result that Mr. Aldrich's resolution extending the tribal government of the Indians was adopted after it was so modified as to carry that government over until March 4, 1907. A number of private bills, most of them granting pension increases, were passed.
